#### From the Editor






## Voting Rights

There's a good chance that on November 6, 2012 Minnesotans will be voting on a

proposed constitutional amendment that would in effect restrict the pool of citizens who can vote to only those who can show a Minnesota state photo ID with their current address on it.

The Council of Nonprofits has taken a strong stand against this measure because their organizations understand that a one-size-fits all approach to election law will necessarily **fence people out of the process**: highly mobile families and young adults, communities of color, victims fleeing violence, people who lose their homes, many seniors, disabled citizens, students - in short, the communities served by nonprofits - will all be disproportionately impacted by this policy.

Women without a current ID (common for elderly women who do not drive) are particularly at risk, since most will need both a birth certificate and a marriage license to obtain an ID.

AUW was a state leader in helping to disprove the need for a Photo ID by contributing to a report, published a year ago, showing that cases of voter impersonation - the only issue a photo ID would address - have been non-existent in Minnesota. The extremely rare cases of ineligible voting that have been prosecuted are for felons voting before their rights have been restored, a problem photo ID would not address.

Here's how you can help:

- 1) **Invite a trained speaker** to talk to your group (AUW, book club, neighborhood group, etc.) about this issue.
- 2) **Become a trained speaker** yourself. We provide the training, materials and resources you need to become a member of our speakers' bureau to talk to groups as opportunities arise.
